

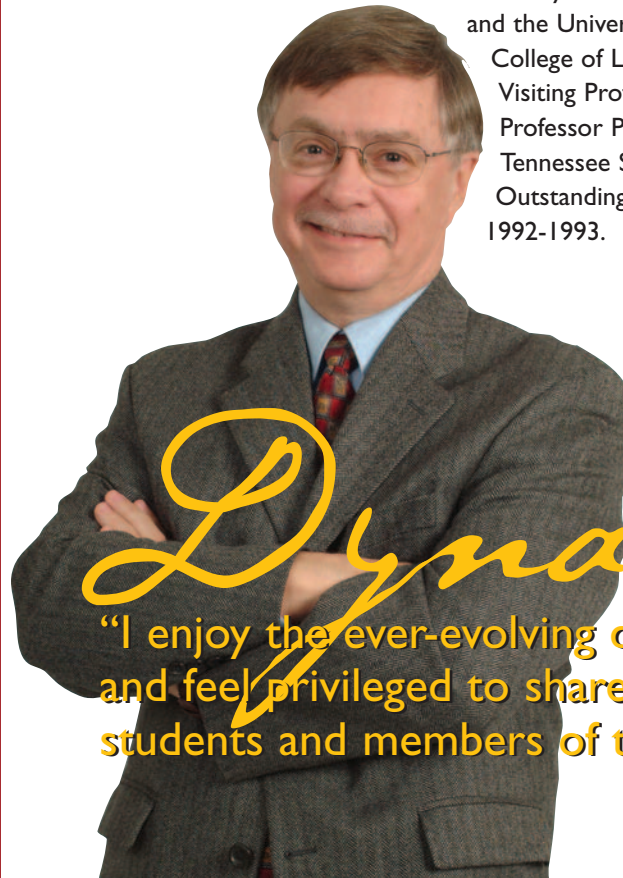
Experience

Phil Prygoski

Professor

Professor Prygoski was in private practice in Ann Arbor, Mich., before joining the faculty in 1977. He also worked in the Commissioners' Office at the Michigan Supreme Court and served as an administrative law judge for the State of Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulation. He has published a dozen law review articles dealing with constitutional law and many have been cited in major treatises and casebooks. He also publishes the *Constitutional Law* volume of the *Sum & Substance* series published by Thomson/West. He is also a member of the American Law Institute. Professor Prygoski has taught constitutional law as a visiting professor at the University of Wisconsin Law School, the University of Tennessee College of Law, and the University of Oklahoma College of Law. While teaching as a Visiting Professor at Tennessee, Professor Prygoski received the Tennessee Student Bar Association's Outstanding Professor Award for 1992-1993.
