Good News! Incoming LSAT honors scholars who reside in Michigan are eligible to receive a 10 percent scholarship level increase.

The Michigan Resident Honors Scholarship Enhancement Program

Michigan resident students are now eligible for a scholarship enhancement at Cooley Law School. Any student eligible for an entering LSAT scholarship who is a Michigan resident is also eligible for a 10 percent scholarship enhancement. For instance, if you qualify for a 25 percent LSAT honors scholarship at Cooley and you are also a qualifying Michigan resident, your new total award is 35 percent of tuition!

LSAT Score	Honors Scholarship	Eligible Michigan Residents
158-162	75%	+10%
153-157	50%	+10%
149-152	25%	+10%

*Michigan resident students admitted to Cooley Law School beginning Trinity Term (summer) 2005 and thereafter are eligible for a scholarship enhancement. Students who matriculated at Cooley in an earlier term are ineligible for the enhancement program, even if they withdrew from classes before completion of a term.

**Enhancements do not apply to Index Honors Scholarships, but eligible students will receive the higher of the Index or enhanced LSAT Scholarship. A student who receives a 100% Honors Scholarship is not eligible for the 10% enhancement.

***This program may be terminated at any time by the School, but the termination will not apply retroactively to students who are enrolled and attending classes at the time of termination. Students receiving these enhancement scholarships are subject to the limitations imposed on the underlying LSAT Honors Scholarships.

Criteria for establishing Michigan residence

Each entering student seeking an enhancement scholarship must sign a sworn affidavit stating that one of the criteria indicated has been met and must provide the applicable supporting documentation. To be a Michigan resident, one of these four must apply:

1. The student graduated from an accredited Michigan college or university within 12 months of the term of enrollment (must submit official transcripts), or
2. The student graduated from a Michigan high school within six years of the term of enrollment (must submit official high school transcript indicating date of graduation), or
3. The student established residence in Michigan at least one year before the term of enrollment (must submit a valid Michigan driver's license and signed copies of Michigan and Federal tax forms from the previous two years), or
4. If the student is not a United States citizen, the student must submit a copy of visa information that proves the student resided in Michigan at least one year before the term of enrollment.
