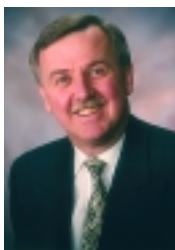


Michigan Administrative Law

New Edition

Dean Don LeDuc

has published the second edition of his text on Michigan administrative law. He has published a supplement to the original text each year for the past seven years. This publication represents a new edition of the material, combining the original text, the supplements, and additional rewrites.

LeDuc notes in the preface of the book that “Only eight years have gone by since the first edition of this text was published.
